

Why is gas with no alcohol cost about a buck a gallon more than regular unleaded with 10% ethanol. Do they really start with the full version and chemically or mechanically remove the alcohol? I think not. I bought a diesel VW at one point to save money on fuel. The thing cost \$2,000 more to get the diesel engine to save a few cents per gallon. Hah!


From Rusty
